Look for objects that begin with that letter.	<b>4</b> Check out <i>A Picture Book of Amelia Earhart</i> by David A. Adler from the library.	<b>5</b> Trace your child's feet on paper and let them color the tracings.	<b>6</b> Create a reading corner using favorite books, pillows, and stuffed animals.
<b>7</b> While giving your child a bath, trace letters on her back and see if she can guess the letter.	<b>8</b> Help your child draw a rainbow. Talk about the colors you are using.	<b>9</b> Can you find a food in your kitchen that is a circle? Make a circle-shaped snack!	<b>10</b> Let your child help turn the pages as you read together today.	<b>11</b> Give your child an action word, such as 'bounce.' Ask him to act it out.	<b>12</b> Invite over a playmate. Make snacks and read together.	<b>13</b> Take your child to the library. Let her pick out a book.
<b>14</b> Use your own lists, letters, and notes to show your child how you write every day.	<b>15</b> Look up an Irish nursery rhyme. Sing it to your child.	<b>16</b> Talk to your child about what happened yesterday. What will happen today? Tomorrow?	<b>17</b> Read <i>Let's Celebrate St. Patrick's Day</i> by Peter and Connie Roop with your child.	<b>18</b> Fill a cup with popcorn. Help your child count how many pieces it takes to fill the cup.	<b>19</b> Talk about the letter F. Make up a silly phrase using words that start with that letter.	<b>20</b> It's spring! Help your child make a list of things she would like to do today. Check them off as you do them.
<b>21</b> Give your child crayons and paper to scribble on. Ask him about what he drew.	<b>22</b> Ask your child to bring you one of something, two of something, and so on.	<b>23</b> Cut hearts out of green paper. Help your child make a shamrock using the hearts.	<b>24</b> Count how many green objects you can see.	<b>25</b> Introduce your child to words to describe how they are feeling, such as happy, sad, and angry.	<b>26</b> Write the name of a simple object (such as 'door') on a sheet of paper. Show your child the object. Have her trace the letters.	<b>27</b> Make up a silly rhyme using your child's name. Sing the rhyme to your child.
<b>28</b> Bake sugar cookies. Help your child count the cookies and then decorate them together with green icing.	<b>29</b> Watch a TV show together. Talk about your child's favorite character after the show.	<b>30</b> Look at a clock. Have your child tell you what each number is.	<b>31</b> Look outside. What animals do you see?
