

O, BOE? Make an instrument to play in New Caledonia with Matea and Joany!

Materials: large straw(s), scissors

Put the straw in your mouth, bite down, and pull out through your teeth to flatten one end. Cut off the edges of the flat end of the straw to make it into a triangle shape. To play the instrument, bite down just beyond the triangular area. Blow hard and softly while biting down with different amounts of pressure until you make the straw "sing." You can experiment with making higher and lower pitch sounds by making other "straw oboes" that are longer or shorter. You can also cut holes in the straw and try playing it by covering the holes with your finger.
