
Themes: Friendship, Poetry, Homelessness, Determination

TIME TO READ!

Before reading: Discuss what rich and poor mean. How many ways are there to be rich? Have children brainstorm; make a list of the answers. After reading, revisit the list. Are there any ways children would add? Remove?

RELATED ACTIVITIES

RECYCLED ART (AGES 5-12)

Materials: any item that is free and is no longer being used for its original purpose (buttons, nuts, sticks, paper scraps, bottle caps, egg cartons, fabric scraps, etc.)

Let children use the “free” items to make a collage or a sculpture. Make sure the children give their creations names. Display the art and invite others to a “gallery” opening. Stumped for ideas? Try www.kinderart.com/recycle to get your creative juices flowing!

\$100 PRIZE (AGES 5-12)

What would you do if you won \$100 in a contest? Give kids an index card to write what they would use the money for. Display the answers on a poster or bulletin board. Have students vote on the most creative use of the money, the strangest, the funniest, the most generous, etc.

SECOND TIME AROUND BOOK EXCHANGE (AGES 5-12)

Organize a book swap at your community center. Ask each child to bring in a few books they’ve already read and don’t want anymore. Keep track of how many books each child brings in. During the swap, kids can pick as many books as they brought. (It’s a good idea to have a few extra books just in case a child forgets or can’t bring any.)
