RELATED ACTIVITIES

RAINDROP SIMULATION SNACK

Ingredients: vanilla yogurt, blueberries

Create a fun, rainy snack by placing one or two scoops of vanilla yogurt at the top of a plate to represent clouds. Place blueberries under the clouds as "raindrops." Enjoy your tasty treat near a window and watch the weather outside. Is it a rainy, sunny, or cloudy day? What's the weather forecast?

RAINDROP SUNCATCHERS

Materials: wax paper, old crayons with no wrappers (blues and white), manual pencil sharpener, scissors, towels, iron (for adult use only!), clear tape

paper on top. Have an adult place a warm iron on the wax paper to melt the shavings. Let cool, then cut out raindrop shapes from the paper. Tape your raindrop suncatchers onto a window and enjoy!
