
Are Trees Alive?

TIME TO READ!



BEFORE WE READ LET'S LOOK AT...

The Cover: Have students make predictions about the book based on the title and cover illustration. Ask your students what they think this story will be about?

Make Connections: Show students the picture of a mother and daughter underneath the tree. Ask, "How do you think trees are like people?" (Optional: Pair Share)

Purpose for Reading: "As we read, compare and contrast trees and people. Think about the ways the words and pictures help you understand the similarities and differences between trees and people."

WHILE WE READ

MONITORING FOR COMPREHENSION

- How can trees protect themselves? How is this similar to the ways humans protect themselves?
- What characteristics about a tree keep it alive?
- What are some ways people can help protect trees?
- Why do trees need to rest? How is this similar to or different than people?

LET'S THINK ABOUT

Our Purpose: How are trees similar to and different than people? As a whole class, in small groups, or in pairs, use a Venn Diagram to compare and contrast trees and people.

Extending Our Thinking: How can people help take care of living things in nature? What ways can we, as a community, contribute to saving the trees?
