Family Traditions

This activity will help students identify special traditions they're learning about in their families and how those traditions make them feel.

This activity is designed to be done independently, although sharing ideas and results is encouraged.

Steps

- 1. Ask your students to think about things they do with their families that feel special. Remind them that both big and small things can be special (e.g., big trips can be special and so can reading together every Friday night or chatting about the day before going to sleep).
- 2. Have them draw or write a list of habits or traditions they would like to continue, either as grown-ups themselves or with their own families one day.
- 3. Then, ask students to write what they feel when they are doing each thing with their family (e.g., happy, excited, calm).
- 4. To extend this activity, have students write a letter to their family or make a drawing about some of their favorite family activities and encourage them to take it home.





Our class is learning about family with literacy resources from Reading Is Fundamental. Complete this activity with your child to help deepen their understanding of family.

What Family Means

Family is one of those words (and feelings) that can be hard to define. In this activity, you and your child will have a chance to discuss what family means to you.

Steps

- 1. Look up a dictionary definition for family and talk about the definition with your child. Do you agree with it? Whether or not you find a definition you agree with, talk to your child about your reasoning.
- 2. After your discussion, write a definition of your own family. Your definition may include names, relationships, pictures, places, etc. Discuss and rewrite your definition until it feels right to both you and your child.
- 3. Talk about how each person came to be a part of your family and what you value about each relationship, however it came to be.
- 4. If you like, draw a picture of your family with your child. It may be realistic, or you may choose to represent your family symbolically (as in a family tree) or geographically (if your family is spread out, pinpoint each family member on a map).
