Family Engagement Overview



Welcome to RIF's Middle School Family Literacy Initiative (MSFLI). Family engagement is a key component of RIF's MSFLI effort. We know families engage with their children's learning in countless ways. RIF's perspective on the importance of family engagement and list of recommended tools and resources are listed here to support your efforts as you implement this program in partnership with RIF.

RIF's Definition of Family Engagement

RIF defines family engagement as positive and ongoing relationships between students' families and educators. Building these relationships is a shared responsibility. Effective family engagement is asset-based, goal-oriented, and culturally affirming.

Why is family engagement important?¹

Meaningful family engagement...

- Is correlated with a decrease in drop-out rates and an increase in graduation rates amongst high schoolers
- Leads to increased student achievement
- Can reduce high levels of truancy
- · Encourages students to have positive attitudes towards learning
- Is associated with improved social skills and higher expectations
- Can improve student-teacher relationships
- Supports the development of trust within schools
- Enhances educators' and students' cultural understanding

Best Practices for Increasing Family Engagement²:

- Involvement → engagement! Shifting the lens and terminology from schoolcentric involvement to relationship-centric engagement can improve outcomes drastically.
- Welcome your families into the building. Invite families to come and join your classroom. Inviting families to engage in classroom activities can help them understand their children's day and spark family conversation about school.

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- Make time for your families. Schedule some time into your week for family engagement and reach out to the families in your class to seek input and provide updates.
- **Break down barriers to access.** Ask about schedules, preferred location for activities, and language preferences. Provide assistance for getting interpreters, transportation, and childcare.
- Improve communication. Ask for family preference for communication and seek administrative support to ensure your own access to a variety of communication techniques (e.g., communication apps, robocall, email, text, newsletter, homeschool liaisons). Make sure to provide a schedule of activities ahead of time and proactively make sure families know they are invited!
- Provide opportunities for families. Family literacy should be celebrated, so provide recognition when families engage in literacy activities when it suits them. Consider ways to highlight family literacy activities within the classroom. This could include weekends, virtually, after hours, or off school property (engagement doesn't have to mean physically present).
