BEFORE READING

The Cover: Have students make predictions about the story based on the cover.

The Pictures: Take a brief picture walk and ask students what they notice about Rachel.

Prior Knowledge: Ask students, "What happens during Spring?"

Vocabulary: Frontload Tier 2 words using the accompanying Vocabulary Guide.

Purpose for Reading: "As we read today, listen to how Rachel Carson inspired the environmental movement."

DURING READING

Check for understanding & make connections:

- How does Rachel feel about spring? What does she see, hear, and smell during this season?
- What things in Rachel's life made her want to study nature and help the environment?
- Why did people think the poison was safe at first? What did they not know about it?

AFTER READING

Our Purpose: How did Rachel Carson inspire the environmental movement?

Extending Our Thinking: Using <u>RIF's Writing Template</u>, have students write a persuasive letter encouraging someone to help protect the environment, using reasons and examples from the text to support their argument.
