

HOW GREEN WAS MY DESERT?

The Thar Desert is the greenest desert in the world. What is the driest desert in the world? Research to find out. Make a poster, chart, or PowerPoint to compare the two (climate, plant and animal life, location, etc.). Why do you think the Thar is so much greener?

Many folk tales use *personification* to make animals or parts of nature into characters. Write a story that personifies an everyday object, like a phone or a bookbag. What is a typical day like for the object? Does it like its job? How does it feel about human beings?
