

TIME TO READ!

Before reading, make connections: Look at the cover and the first few pages. Where does the story take place? How is this place different from where you live? What does the title tell us?

While reading, look at the pictures: How do the illustrations help you to understand the story? Point out the constellations in the pictures.

After reading, ask questions:

- Why did Coyote want to climb to the heavens?
- How did he get there?
- What did he do to the stars?
- What are these star shapes called?
- What do you dream about when you look at the stars?

RELATED ACTIVITIES

STAR FRUIT SALAD


Ingredients: pineapple slices, star fruit, strawberries, or any other fruit that your child likes

Slice the fruit into bite-sized pieces. Mix the fruit together into a glass bowl. Spoon into smaller bowls to serve. Add yogurt or ice cream if desired.

PAINT SPECK CONSTELLATIONS

Materials: black construction paper, white or silver paint, paint brushes or old toothbrushes and popsicle sticks

Dip paint brush in paint. Move brush over paper and tap lightly to shake off specks of paint. Try to make a pattern that looks like the night sky. Older children can try to



make a real constellation like the Big
Dipper or Draco. If you use an old toothbrush, run
bristles over a popsicle stick to flick off the paint
like stars. (A good source for star charts is
www.spaceplace.nasa.gov.

OUT AND ABOUT

Go outside on a clear night and look at the stars. Try to find some of the constellations. A long time ago, people made up stories about the sky to explain these constellations. Go online to print out a star map for the night you choose: www.kids astronomy.com/astroskymap/constellations.htm.
