## TIME TO READ!

**Before reading:** This story is about a father born in Japan raising a daughter in San Francisco, California. Ask students to notice the problems that Yuriko faces at school and think about how she solves them.

## **RELATED ACTIVITIES**

#### JAPANESE LOGIC PUZZLES (AGES 6-12)

#### SNACKING WITH CHOPSTICKS (ALL AGES)

#### Materials: chopsticks

Chopsticks have been around a lot longer than forks and are still going strong. Give students chopsticks. Show kids how to use them if they don't know; children can model for each other. Have students eat their snacks using their chopsticks.
