#### **EXPANDABLE CLASS BOOK**


Materials: white or construction paper, tape, markers or pens


#### FIREWORKS FACTS

#### **COMMUNITY CALENDAR**

As a class, make a calendar that includes all the holidays and festivals students are celebrating that month. Let students be the ones who suggest special dates to add. Ask students to share a little bit about the traditions and celebrations of the holidays they contribute to the calendar. (Students can also share more personal celebrations, like a family birthday or anniversary.)



### **GLOBAL CELEBRATIONS**

Different cultures have different ways of celebrating a new year. Put students into pairs or small groups. Let each group choose a country. Have them research to find out how and when people in that country celebrate the new year. Does everyone in the country celebrate the same way? Groups should creatively share their findings with the class.



## A (FIRE)WORK OF ART

Materials: black paper, paint, stick or paint brush, straw, glitter (optional)

Give each student a piece of black paper. Drip small drops of brightly colored paint on each paper. Blow paint drops with a straw to make fireworks shapes. Before the paint is dry, have students sprinkle glitter on the paint.
