

THINK-TAC-TOE ACTIVITY OPTIONS

- Individual students can choose an activity to complete.
- Student pairs or cooperative groups can work together on a choice of their own.
- Educators can assign an activity for an individual, pairs or groups.



RHYME TIME

The poems in this story don't rhyme. Write your own poem that *does* rhyme. Pick a rhyming pattern, or *rhyme scheme*, and write a poem about someone in your family. Draw a picture to go with your poem.

Word Smart/Creative Writing

LOVELY LILACS

There are a lot of lilacs in this book. Research to find out more about lilacs. Find out at least 10 facts about lilacs, including their *scientific name*. Share your findings in a brochure. Be sure to make it colorful and interesting!

Science/Informative Writing

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Use your **LAST NAME** to write an *acrostic poem* about your family. For each letter of your last name, think of a word or phrase that describes your family and why you love them. Decorate your poem.

Example: Care about me Happy Open-minded

EXTRA, EXTRA!

Your family is a big deal—when you have a reunion, the newspaper writes about it! Write an article about an imaginary family reunion. Who comes? Where do you meet? What food do you eat? Does anything exciting happen? Remember, a good article also has a headline!

GIVING THANKS

The grandmother is the one who brings everyone together in *Some Kind of Love*. Write a letter to your grandmother, grandfather or someone special to thank them for everything they've done for you. Draw a picture to go with your letter.

THE NUMBER GAME

In the book, 100 people come to the family reunion. If there are 4 people in each family, how many families are at the reunion? What if there are 5 people in each family? If 20 families have 4 people and all the rest have 5 people, how many families have 5 people? Remember, there are 100 people in total!

Math

SHALL I COMPARE THEE...

The poems in this book use a lot of *figurative language*, like "your midnight faces." Figurative language helps a writer paint a picture or create a mood with words. Write a poem or short story about yourself. Describe yourself using figurative language. Is your hair black as night? Are your eyes blue like the ocean?

FUN FOR THE WHOLE FAMILY

Everyone has funny stories about their family! Write a story or draw a comic strip about a trip your family took, or about something funny or exciting that happened to your family. Draw a picture to go with your story.

Word Smart/Narrative Writing

MAPMAKER, MAPMAKER

In the book, families travel from Cincinnati and Chicago to St. Louis, Missouri, for the reunion. How far away are those cities? Find the states these cities are in. Draw a map to show the distance. Put your own city on the map. How far away are you from St. Louis? Be sure to include a *compass rose* and a *map key*.
