TIME TO READ!

Before reading, make connections: What is your child thankful for? Where do those things come from?

While reading, look at the big picture: Notice how all the plants and animals in the book are *connected*. Each one plays an important role in the circle of life.

After reading, ask questions:

- What are the "gifts of life"?
- Why is the author thankful for these gifts?
- Why do you think Earth is called Mother Earth?
- Can people live off of the land alone? Why or why not?

RELATED ACTIVITIES

DELICATE EARTH HANGING

Materials: crayon shavings, wax paper, iron, paper towel, string, scissors

- 1. Lay wax paper on work surface. Draw circle on wax paper. Place different colors of crayon shavings in circle to represent Earth.
- 2. Place the ends of the string inside circle. Cover with another sheet of wax paper. Put paper towel on top.
- 3. With iron on low, apply heat until crayon shavings have melted. Cool completely. Use scissors to cut around circle (don't cut string). Remove wax paper from both sides.

Hang in a sunny window as a reminder of how gently to treat Mother Earth.

MAPLE SYRUP CANDY

Ingredients: 1 cup maple syrup, 1/2 cup water, 1/2 cup walnuts (or other nut) and/or 1 cup dried fruit

In a deep pot, combine syrup and water. Cook over medium heat until blended and smooth. Drop nuts into mixture. Remove nuts with a slotted spoon and place on wax paper to cool. Repeat with fruit if desired. Let cool and enjoy!
